

FALL RALLY - TIME, SPEED & DISTANCE

he 15th annual world famous Canadian Rally – Targa Newfoundland takes place from September 7th to 15th in a road (tarmac-based) annual event covering nearly 2,000-kilometre over a seven-day period in multiple stages. Two weeks later, UCR holds its Fall Rally on October 1st, 2017.

Targa, where the objective is to meet or slightly better the stage times set by the organizers for the age, displacement and modification level of the vehicle is not our goal at UCR where we focus on "fun" while observing a time-speed-distance rally (TSD Rally) format emphasizing precision in maintaining the average speed set by the organizers.

This is a navigational rally where the driver and navigator are given a route sheet with instructions on making left and right turns after specified distances in kilometers and miles. That's right, there are no street names or other landmarks identified. All one needs to participate is a pencil, a watch and a clipboard, plus of course a Porsche. This is a PCA Rally exclusively for members, their guests and Porsches. There will be multiple checkpoints to ensure that the cars are on the right course. Points are lost if a car arrives too early at a checkpoint and loses points for being late. The goal is precision and arrival at or as close as possible to the timing set for each stage by the organizer.

or the first time, our 2017 UCR Fall Rally will begin from a northwest-end venue, starting in North York at Johnvince Foods, 555 Steeprock Drive, Toronto off Dufferin Road south of Finch.

y son Phil had been driving for several years, but it was the recent purchase of his own car that prompted me to sign him up for this year's Street Survival School. At only \$75, it was certainly a no-brainer form of insurance!

Some young people put up resistance to such a parental offer, protesting that they already know how to drive, not appreciating the need to improve their skills. Major league baseball players surely know how to play the game, but they spend every day on the field trying to improve their skills. They do it because of their competitive spirit and the millions of dollars they can earn. Drivers should work at improving their skills every day too, but with somewhat different motivation - to stay alive, avoid accidents, improve vehicle control and make driving more fun. Anyway, Phil didn't resist at all. I was pleased to find him checking out the Street Survival School website to learn what was in store for him. Of course, I already knew what to expect, as this was my second year participating as an in-car coach.

We arrived bright and early to a huge parking lot where the 48-student capacity had been filled and 50 BMW Trillium Club and UCR in-car coaches, classroom instructors and other volunteers were there to greet them. Phil and I parted company when he found his designated in-car coach and I found the two students assigned to me for the day. The schedule and student/ coach pairings were designed so one of my students spent the first hour driving with me as her coach, while my second student spent that first hour in the classroom For the second hour they switched places as the program repeated itself and followed the same alternating pattern for the rest of the day.

Both my students were indeed competent drivers, and came with the attitude that they were willing to learn and practice new ideas. In the Wake and Brake exercise, plastic cones were set up at the other end of the course and another pair a few yards beyond them. I asked each of my students to accelerate towards the first pair of

cones and to brake at my command as we reached and drove between them. The goal was to stop before reaching the second pair of cones. This was easily accomplished because my students anticipated the command and slowed before I gave it. Indeed, their cars stopped with moderate, steady pedal pressure. But what if they hadn't anticipated the need to stop suddenly and had been going faster? Next time around I suggested they accelerate harder, then stomp on the brake and try to push it through the floor. This was not something they were used to doing. When we talked about it, they admitted that they feared the car might skid, or they didn't want to be hard on their car. They both had an aversion to slamming on their brakes but they realized this was what they'd need to do if a car stopped suddenly in front of them or a pedestrian stepped off the curb without seeing them. So how do we know what to do in an emergency situation? We don't know how driver and car would behave if we've never experienced it. This program gave them the opportunity to practice emergency situations while maintaining full control of their cars.

Other in-car exercises involved weaving through different configurations of cones that were set up to develop different driving skills such as distance vision, crash avoidance, safety awareness, smooth driving and skid

At the start of the day, many of the students had a serious, slightly nervous look on their faces. By midmorning there were smiling faces and big grins as they realized how much fun they were having while improving their skills. There was my son, Phil, on the course a few cars ahead of me. I could see him grinning from ear to ear as I sat with my student waiting for her turn. At lunch, he told me how much he was enjoying himself and how much he was learning. My two students couldn't wait to get started again so they could practice what they had learned in the classroom. And so the day progressed, with every exercise reinforcing and building new skills.

At the end of the day, there was a great sense of achievement among the students in their newly-acquired skills and a better understanding of their capabilities and those of their vehicles, too. Some students were shaking their heads, wondering why the program wasn't compulsory for all drivers, especially since the cost was so affordable at only \$75. Unbelievable value, they said. My students readily admitted that they hadn't known what they hadn't known, but were looking forward to practicing their newly acquired skills in their every-day driving. Of course, neither of them looked forward to handling an emergency situation, but both felt better prepared to do so.

As for my son, Phil, he was on a high all the way home. "I thought it would be pretty good", he admitted, "but I had no idea it would be that much fun. Now I feel that I know my car and its capabilities, as well as my own. Driving is going to be much more fun and I'm going to practice these techniques to become a safer, smarter driver until they become second nature." Then, to my surprise, he asked me to tell him about "this Autocross stuff that your club does." Sounds like my son is becoming a car enthusiast... like me!

Will the tiles scratch?

The tiles are plastic, so yes they can scratch. However, the color is consistent throughout the tile, so if they do scratch it isn't that noticeable.

Can I install my four-post car lift on top of RaceDeck?

A four-post lift will be fine to REST on top of the floor but if you are going to BOLT it your floor, you will want to trim the tiles to fit around the posts bolted to the concrete.

Can this be used over a radiant heated garage floor?

Yes, you will just want to leave the tiles in the boxes in the heated garage for a couple of days to acclimate. You will want to install the tiles at the hottest part of the day so they are at their most expanded state.


I still had an hour of daylight, so I quickly washed and chamoised my Guards Red beauty before tucking her into the garage.

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

ne of the reasons that I find the social aspects of our Track Program so valuable is that they tend to moderate behavior. Let's face

it; there are as many different personalities out there as there are DNA combinations. I know drivers who are the kindest most considerate people on earth until they put on a helmet. I also know some "Type A" people who are cautious on the track. The way that they see those around them, has a direct effect on their behavior in traffic. That's why we encourage everyone to get together and share their experiences.

If you think of the drivers around you as coworkers just trying to get home or to work, the same as you, your commutes will be a lot less stressful and you will enjoy your drive a great deal more. Being polite in traffic, on and off the track, is really to your own benefit.

There are places to go if you want to test your talent in a friendly environment a little beyond Driver Education. I have lots of friends who have gone racing over the years. Some of them continue to drive at DE's in order

to extend their seat time, while joining an additional series to test their limits. Many of our own members drive in CASC and VARAC events in order to remove the limitations that a DE format imposes. A few of them have been trying to talk me into joining them for a few years now, but unfortunately the summer is my peak business season and the DE program takes up my spare time.

I don't know if it was the good scotch or the good friends who made me give in to temptation this season, but I agreed to co-drive for a few weekends in the GT Challenge Enduro races. Just for fun. No pressure and nothing to get famous for. Just get together with some friends and drive without limits for extended periods of time. What first seemed like a small change from what we already do on track grew in magnitude at each step. First you need to pass the medical requirements. They aren't too stringent, because they let me in, and I'm not what you would call an athlete.

Then came the gear. It's not like DE where a helmet and a fire extinguisher are your ticket to endless lapping. To actually race (no pointing to pass) you need a driving suit, balaclava, better helmet, Hans device, ear plugs, gloves and shoes. All of it fire rated and none of it fashionable. The worst part of having all new gear is that everyone knows that you're a rookie and a danger to everyone. The humiliation is furthered by forcing you to put black triangles on your car so other drivers can identify you on track and try to save their paint work. At this point you have to ask yourself if you're having fun yet. Who's idea was this anyway?

When you finally get to the event, that's when you re-

alize that it's going to be fun. You see half a dozen UCR members there to start with, so you know that you're not in this alone. Everyone from the officials to the guys in the next trailer, come up and welcome you. There are offers of help, bottled water passed around and lots of race track gossip. There is a real sense of community amongst those who try and beat each other the hardest. In the paddock everyone is "friends". When they pass the green flag they are competitors and when they cross the finish line, they become best of friends again.

I started out pretty darn slow, but I haven't spent much time in a car in the past few years and I was driving one of Del Bruce's cars. He took a couple of cars to the event, so he could drive one of his Corvettes in the G70 Sprint races and have a partner for the Enduro in the 944. It took some seat time for me to start to feel confident in the handling and worry less about scratching someone else's car. The skills that you develop in the UCR DE program remain with you though. All you have to do is brush them off and put them to use.

Over the course of the day my lap times dropped eight seconds a lap and we finished our first two hour endure race second in our class and seventh overall. The next one is a three hour enduro in September and I'm sure we can do better. We still have to work on our driver changes though. We are both big guys and it looked a little bit like a clown car there for a few minutes. The highlight for me was my thirty minute battle with a Lotus. I got by

it three times, only to be passed on the next straight by all of their horsepower. I could have done that all day!

There are lots of things that I left out of this article that filled out the weekend. Some were frustrating, some exhilarating, but the answer to the most important question (Was it fun?) is definitely yes. Great friends, great cars and a great drive. What's not to like?

September is always a "big numbers" event where everyone realizes that the season is waning. Now is the time to get as much seat time as possible before the inevitable cool weather comes. I was impressed by how many people kept coming back this season, despite dealing with rain most weekends. If anything the changeable weather will have increased the skill level of this year's batch of beginners. The time to learn smoothness and respect for the track is at the beginning so those lessons stav with you.

Our Instructor Day on September 22nd promises to add a few more qualified National Instructors to our list as the National Stewards come up and put us through their program. We're constantly grateful to the men and women who volunteer their time and efforts to teach others the skills they have acquired. Our Instructors are second to none and deserve our thanks.

farm equipment.



know that you will hear it from others but . . . elections are coming up in November and we will be determining who manages our club and its activities next year. The new board, in turn, should appoint




areas that you have some modest skill at. It's not just about P-cars. It's about people. You and me.
